Today, we would like you to get to know Anthony Featherstone, GCDF, Executive Director of WorkSource Montgomery Inc.

## We asked Anthony three questions surrounding leadership and goals. Read his responses below.

1. As you look back over your life, at what point did you begin to think of yourself as a leader?

I don't think there's a point where I've ever thought of myself as leader. I look at myself as someone with responsibilities – to myself, family, community, our organization, partners, etc. Others may (or may not) see me as a leader from my actions brought about from my sense of responsibility, but I have never put much "stock" into being a leader in my self-reflection. I'm more focused on striving to fulfill my purpose and responsibilities—sometimes that requires for me to be out front as a leader, sometimes not.

2. Do you have a vision that guides your body of work? If so, has it changed over time or remain the same?

I want to help as many people as possible to find their way to earning a truly livable wage. That has been my focus my entire professional career in workforce development. I'm bias as a workforce development professional, but I think this profession is one of the best ways to be of service to your community.

3. Does the work you do now play a part in the legacy you wish to leave behind? If not, describe what tools you need to help you achieve your goals.

I believe so. One of our primary goals at WSM is to build leaders, programs, and systems to affect positive change. If my contributions to those leaders, programs, and systems continue to produce positive impacts, that would be a cool legacy to leave behind.
